We have one Pack in Cheddington which meets on a Wednesday evening between 7.00 and 8.15. It is open to young people who are aged between 8 and 10½ years old.

Scouting is one of the great success stories of the last 100 years. From an experimental camp for 20 boys on Brownsea island in 1907, it has spread to 216 countries and territories, with an estimated 28 million members. In Cheddington, the first Cub Scouts started in 1927. So there is a long history of boys and girls being Cubs

Cubs is the second section of the Scouting movement, originally started in 1916 for younger brothers and sisters who wanted a 'look-in'. In nearly a century, the section has constantly evolved and adapted its programme and methods to meet the changing needs of each generation of young people, and these days admits girls as well as boys.

ACTIVITIES

During their time in the Pack, Cub Scouts will get a chance to try lots of different activities like swimming, music, exploring, computing and collecting.

There are a range of badges available which Cub Scouts can wear on their uniforms to show everyone how well they're doing.

Cub Scouts also get to go on trips and days out, to places like the zoo, theme parks or a farm. Sometimes they will be able to go camping with the rest of the .



Cub Scouts who gained badges whilst in Beavers can transfer the following on to their Cub Scout Uniform:

- Staged Activity Badges (These are round badges which are turquoise in the middle with blue edging)
- Their Moving on Award (This is oblong with a yellow centre and a red edge)
- Any Occasional Badges
- Any Gallantry / Meritorious Conduct Awards (These are grey badges with a coloured knot motif)
- The Chief Scouts Bronze Award (This is a blue oval shape with bronze stitching)

Pack and take part in all kinds of outdoor activities.

STRUCTURE AND ORGANISATION

A Pack of Cub Scouts is organised into Sixes, with each Six named after a colour, and a Sixer and a Seconder in charge. The recommended maximum size of a Cub Scout Pack is 36 Cub Scouts. To meet local circumstance this maximum

number may be increased, either in the long term or the short term with the agreement of the Group Scout Leader
